What Not to Mix With CBD

CBD may change how some medicines work because the same liver enzymes break down both CBD and certain drugs, including:



- Acetaminophen
- Amiodarone, a heart rhythm medicine
- Antidepressants
- Anti-seizure drugs including clobazam, lamotrigine, and valproate
- Levothyroxine, a thyroid medication
- NSAIDs
- Opioid pain relievers
- Warfarin, a blood thinner

CBD Side Effects

CBD can have side effects, which may include:

- Drowsiness or sleepiness
- Diarrhea
- Decreased appetite
- Liver damage
- Mood changes



If your medication or supplement has similar effects as CBD, you can get an overload of symptoms. For example:

 Opioids, benzodiazepines (such as Ativan or Xanax), antipsychotics, antidepressants, antihistamines (such as Benadryl), or alcohol



Could cause increased sleepiness, fatigue, and the possibility of accidental falls

Stimulants (such as Adderall)



Could cause decreased appetite

• Diabetes drug metformin or heartburn drugs (such as Prilosec)



Could bring higher risk of diarrhea

 Supplements, such as kava, melatonin, and St. John's wort



Could cause increased sedation and tiredness



Don't Drive

Taking CBD and driving can be dangerous. It can cause sleepiness, sedation, and lethargy. Avoid operating a motor vehicle.
